We had the privilege of speaking with someone who has dedicated many years to shaping the lives of students and supporting the growth of both staff and community. Mr. Murphy, who has been an integral part of Woodbrook College for 26 years, is preparing to retire after a distinguished career in education. In this special interview, we reflect on Mr. Murphy's journey, the lessons learned, and the memories created over a career that has truly made a lasting impact.

Mia: Thank you for joining us, Mr. Murphy, and congratulations on reaching this incredible milestone. Let's begin by looking back at your time at Woodbrook College— What is your fondest memory here?

Mr. Murphy: I have lots of fond memories, just seeing people happy, seeing people with their Leaving Cert and Junior Cert results and knowing that they are going to go on and get the career they want.

Mia: Yes, like seeing people achieve?

Mr. Murphy: Seeing the people achieve and seeing people who doubted themselves going out with a big happy head out the door, that is what I want and good grades. That makes me happy.

Ruth: That is lovely! What do you think was your biggest challenge transition-

ing from classroom teacher to Deputy Principal?

Mr. Murphy: I miss teaching big time, miss having a bit of a giggle in the class-room and doing the work with the students. I try to get around the corridors and meet people and have a bit of a giggle with them. I just miss the interaction big time in the classroom.

Mia: Which do you enjoy more? Teaching or Deputy Principal?

Mr. Murphy: There are disadvantages to both; with teaching you get to close the door, and you keep everybody out and that is great. With Deputy Head I miss the teaching; I like certain parts of it. It is nice to get to present stuff to people like awards and different things. I miss having the classroom and a bit of the banter and building up relationships with 25 or 30 students.

Mia: What will you miss the most when you retire?

Mr. Murphy: The drive! I like driving up because you get your head together for about 45 minutes. Also, just 700 people walking around every hour, there is no other job that you can say there are 700 people walking around and you get to see people and make sure they are all right. Whether you just give them a wink or just a thumbs up, just to make sure everybody is okay.

Ruth: What was your favorite part about coming to school every day?

Mr. Murphy: Well, my wife would not write me a sick note *laughs*. The unpredictability of it. You just never know what is going to happen, sometimes it will put you in a bad mood but other times it would put you in a brilliant mood when you get good news, and you just see people and they are in better form than they were yesterday.

Mia: Yes, every day is different in Woodbrook College!

Mr. Murphy: Every hour is different; in fact, every minute is different around here!

Mia: What is your favorite event in the school year?

Mia: So the big question is...why do you call everyone a mushroom!?

ALL THINGS BATON TWIRLING! Our European Champion Rían Dease

Over the summer, the very talented Rían Dease won a gold medal for baton twirling. Keeley Nagle and Millie Waters interviewed him on his incredible journey and achievement.

Keeley: Thank you for meeting with us today, Rian. We are very excited to learn all about baton twirling and your achievements. Can you explain to us what baton twirling is?

Rían: It is my pleasure to be talking to you today! Baton twirling is a sport that combines dance, strength and flexibility in several different events which include solos, pairs and teams. The main component is the use of these three skills while manipulating one, two or three batons.

Millie: That sounds difficult! At what age did you begin this sport?

R: I started baton when I was ten which is a later start than usual as most people generally start between the ages of four or five. This meant that I had to work really hard to catch up to people my age.

K: So, how many hours and days do you train a week?

R: I train four times a week which is ten hours in total. Twice a month I attend the national Ireland squad which all the selected athletes from the whole of Ireland come together to participate in an Ireland squad.

M: And how do you prepare for your competitions?

R: Leading up to competitions I prepare by doing extra training on top of the required hours. Before I compete, I ensure to have a clear mind and a positive attitude as this boosts my confidence and surround myself with the people that support me the most.

K: It sounds like you are very dedicated to the sport, who helped you get to this point of baton?

R: My club coaches from Greystones baton twirlers have taught me everything I know and have helped me achieve things I never imagined I would achieve. But I wouldn't be anywhere without the support of my parents.

M: It sounds like you have an amazing support network around you. Who inspires you the most?

R: The person that inspires me the most in the world of baton is the European champion of 2023 Anna Zafra from Spain. I really connect with her style of twirling, and I aspire to be like her. But the person close to me that inspires me the most is my big sister who made this sport known to me.

K: Is it time demanding? How many competitions do you attend a year?

R: I attend six home competitions all around Ireland. These competitions lead up to the international competitions in the summer. The best from each section is selected to compete in the annual world and European competitions. I have been selected to represent Ireland for the past four years and I am hoping to do the same this year.

M: What has been your fondest memory of baton so far?

R: My fondest memory of my baton experience so far is competing with my pair partner Millie at the world championships in Sweden.

K: What was your experience winning your medals?

R: I have won three medals at European Championship level but my most recent is my gold medal in my solo. This was a proud achievement for me but also a relief because I entered the final round in 1st place and knew I had to keep the title.

M: What are your goals to achieve this season?

R: My goal for this season is to place high as I have entered a higher level which is called level A. I can't wait to see what this season entails, and I can't wait to do it with all my friends
























Home Ec in the Spotlight
